#### HighGear Past, Present, and Future

HIGHGEAR PAST: Since its 1958 inception, RMR's newsletter, HighGear, has had a variety of names. Until the early 1970s it was called Porsche Patter, with then-Editor Frank Barrett in the driver's seat. The Newsletter was its name in the mid-1970s with Editor Anne Barrett in charge. In the late-1970s Ted Shaw became editor, and in the mid-80s the newsletter was renamed yet again, this time RMR / Porsche, with Joe Holbert as editor. In the late-1980s RMR's newsletter was renamed RMR Vista with Editor Mike Massman in command. Somewhere in the 2000s it became HighGear, with Jeremy Rosenberger at the wheel. While there have been many editors in RMR's 65 years, all of those listed above were awarded PCA's prestigious Paul Heinmiller Award for best overall newsletter among the club's many regions. (Note: in 2012 the award was renamed the Betty Jo Turner Award for Newsletter Excellence.)

**HIGHGEAR PRESENT:** I have designed and laid out RMR's award-winning newsletter for 5½ years, creating 61 issues. After the production of the December 2023 HighGear, I will "retire" as editor. RMR is blessed with board members, columnists, and photographers who regularly submit text and photographs for use in our newsletter. For quality control, RMR has an exceptional copy editor, Frank Barrett. For printing and mailing the hard copies of HighGear, we have a wonderful Englewood-based printer, Creative Image Printing.

**HIGHGEAR FUTURE:** So RMR is looking for its next editor, a volunteer with great project management and communication skills, proficiency in the Adobe Creative Suite, including InDesign, Photoshop, and Acrobat Pro, and familiarity with Dropbox and SmugMug. Each issue has taken about 30 hours a month to create. If you are one of our 3,500 members, have the necessary skills, and are interested in this volunteer role, please contact me.








#### Keep Raising the Bar Higher

#### The Dance

When I started driving many years ago, I never thought I would be asked to write about it. Now you will all have to suffer through my ramblings.

You may have heard people say that smooth is fast. They are right, but driving smoothly goes deeper than that. My first instructor, Fred, told me that the fastest way around the track is a waltz. When I rode with him, I understood what he meant.

Driving a Porsche on the track is a dance. It requires deep connection between the driver and the car. The driver must become one with the machine, understanding its nuances and moving in harmony with its capabilities. It's not just about pushing the accelerator to the floor; it's also knowing when to brake, how to shift, and how to position the car on the track.

Just as a waltz has a distinct rhythm, driving a Porsche on the track also follows a rhythm of its own. The driver must navigate each corner, straightaway, and chicane with well-timed cadence. Too much speed, and you may lose control; too little, and you will lag behind. It's a delicate balance, much like the steps of a waltz, where each move must be perfectly timed and executed to create a seamless and elegant performance.

Precision is the key to both. In a waltz, the dancers must hit the right beats and positions to create a beautiful performance. Similarly, a Porsche driver must hit the apex of each turn, stay within the racing line, and make split-second decisions with surgical precision. The margin for error is slim, and the driver must

constantly read and react to the changing dynamics of the track, just as a dancer reads their partner's movements.

Just as in a waltz, where the lead and follow roles are crucial, driving on the track requires the driver to lead the car, then the car will follow the driver's commands. The driver communicates with the car through the steering, throttle, and brakes, guiding it through the twists and turns of the track. The car responds to the driver's inputs, translating their intention into action. It's a dialogue between human and machine, a partnership that requires trust and mutual understanding.

Driving a Porsche on the race track is an art form. It's not just about getting from point A to point B as fast as possible; it's about the expression of skill, passion, and emotion. A skilled Porsche driver uses the car as their canvas, painting the track with their precise lines, smooth transitions, and calculated maneuvers. It's a symphony of mechanical and human prowess, a masterpiece that is created every lap!

The next time you go to the race track for high-performance driving in your Porsche, remember that driving on a track is more than the just the pursuit of speed and adrenalin. It is finesse, rhythm, precision, and artistry. It will require you to become one with your car, to feel the rhythm of the track, and to express yourself though the movements of your car. Just like a waltz, it is a performance that captivates the senses and leaves an indelible impression that lingers long after the dance is over.

## PORSCHE 356 & 911 PARTS

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




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This 55-mile-long route provides matchless views of the Continental Divide and its timbered approaches.

The July 29 Peak-to-Peak Tour started like all tours except four hours later than normal; at 12:30 PM we experienced a deluge of rain at check-in. Nevertheless, 45 Porsches and 87 participants braved the weather and a threat of hail to attend the drivers meeting at The Man Cave in Westminster, which graciously let us move indoors. Just as the meeting ended and we were ready to depart, the rain stopped, then the sun came out and stayed with us all afternoon. Four groups made their way to Golden Gate Canyon Road outside Golden. Here we started into the mountains on a beautiful curved road with little traffic, allowing the cars to do what they were designed for, carving turns as we headed toward the Peak to Peak Highway.


This well-known Scenic By-Way runs from Blackhawk to Estes Park. Approaching Rollinsville, we had spectacular scenic views of the Continental Divide peaks. The route took us into Nederland, west of Boulder, for a rest stop and a chance to regroup. Leaving Nederland, we continued on the Peak to Peak past Ferncliff, Allenspark, and Meeker Park, where we saw Longs Peak, the highest peak in Rocky Mountain National Park, still hidden by high clouds. We also passed Camp St. Malo, known for its distinctive Church on the Rock.

Our destination was the Lazy B Chuckwagon, seven miles south of Estes Park. As we pulled in, we were greeted by staff who directed us to parking around the lodge. Our Lazy B host, Quentin, was relieved when the threat of rain disappeared 10 minutes before the first group arrived; they had experienced hail every afternoon for a week. Before dinner we sat on the deck as the clouds cleared over Longs Peak, the sun came out, and we took the opportunity to photograph our cars with the pond in the foreground and the mountains as a backdrop. Everyone enjoyed the chance to visit and talk about their Porsches.

The Lazy B treated us to a real chuckwagon dinner on tin plates (to avoid the hot food burning your hand, hold the plates next to the peaches). Dinner was followed by a wonderful music show featuring western songs and group participation. Everyone was smiling, laughing, and singing old songs that they had heard on western TV shows when they were younger. The follow-up survey indicated high approval ratings for the show, entertainment, and a new tour experience for Rocky Mountain Region participants. We plan to repeat this tour next year.

# Rijkspolitie SC Targa | Corgi



About the model: This SC Targa casting was created by Corgi, which is a British toy manufacturer founded in 1956. Corgi has made a large variety of scale model cars, but typically made them 1:43 and 1:24 scales. Corgi Toys was eventually purchased by Mattel in 1989, and a few of their castings (including this one) were used within the Hot Wheels line thereafter. This particular model was produced somewhere around 1990, while still under the Corgi banner. The Rijkspolitie car is in appropriate white and orange colors and includes the famous whale tale.











About the car: The Rijkspolitie (state police) was the Dutch police force from 1945 through 1996. They must have had an affinity for Porsches like the rest of us, as their car of choice was the 911 Targa for most of its existence. The Targa was selected as it gave officers the ability to direct traffic, etc. from the safety of the car. The Rijkspolite were not the only police force to utilize the Porsche badge; the Belgian, German and Austrian police forces have historically utilized Porsches as well. A friend of mine fell in love with Porsche as a child when, as a boy, he witnessed a Rijkspolitie Porsche chase down an Opel Asocona. I wonder how many enthusiasts were born from seeing Porsche police vehicles dressed in orange and white (or white and green) chasing down inferior cars. In contrast, I do not see that many Crown Vic enthusiasts.





Last October, while planning 2023 autocrosses, Logan and I decided to co-chair the June event and have a Pride Month theme. The most important task was to come up with a properly cheeky event name! Logan gets the credit for Slalom Are Welcome...sl-ALL-om are welcome...ALL are welcome. Get it? Our charity is also LGBTQ-focused, The Center on Colfax,

which provides services and a community center in this region.

Logan's first course design ended up being a lot of fun. During the setup we had to make a few changes (as usual) to avoid tie-downs and bad pavement and improve the "flow" of the course. As demonstrated in the results, it paid off. Typically the top finishers are in the C5 class, which includes the highest-performance models like the GT3 and GT4. Not this time! Lots of C4 cars (981 Caymans and Boxsters, in general) made the top of the podium, a testament to the course not giving the high-horse-power cars a distinct advantage!

Having spent the first part of that week at the Porsche Parade in Palm Springs, we came back early for this autocross. We traveled with Vicki Cox-Jones and Harry Jones, and on the home stretch on Thursday evening, storms between Colorado Springs and Denver led us to stop for dinner to wait them out. As I was parking, a curb jumped out of no-

where and hit my car! I was gutted. It was more than cosmetic damage, as a tire was rubbing on left turns, and the passenger-side radiator got pushed into the wheel well.

Since I couldn't autocross my car, Vicki offered to let me co-drive hers. Thank you, Vicki!

The weekend greeted us with perfectly sunny, warm, storm-free weather. Both run groups got eight runs, and aside from the set-up challenges, timing and scoring was flawless.

We again had a good number of new autocrossers, always great to see. Plenty of instructors helped them find their way and ensured that they had a great time. Results can be found on page 23.










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
## **MODEL MEMBER: GARY HOSKINS**

First re-read Susan Eastman's excellent profile of Gary Hoskins in the December 2022 HighGear, then here is "The Rest of the Story" that Susan touched on.



You might remember the Revell line of model cars that Gary preferred. He built them all: hot rods, muscle cars, show cars, TV cars (like my favorite, the Munstermobile) or just regular production ones. Gary still has a couple of trophies won for his models. Ah, those detailed instructions, intricate parts, and intoxicating Testor's glue. That heady stuff is still sold, but don't tell us what's in it. Maybe those glue fumes addicted Gary to cars, but whatever, he's still high on them. By 1989 he bought his first real Porsche; owning six more since, he finally became stuck to and part of our marque.

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

# Porsche Unseen: Design Studies

by Stefan Bogner and Jan Karl Baedeker

For glimpses into Porsche's future — or perhaps what might have been — the Stuttgart-based manufacturer of sports cars (and sporting SUVs!) has compiled 15 previously unreleased design studies from 2005 to 2019 into *Porsche Unseen: Design Studies*, a new book published by Delius Klasing.

"When it comes to the visions we develop, it is not about bringing every car onto the road. Instead, it is more a question of establishing creative space and a relationship with the future," states Style Porsche Vice President Michael Mauer. "There are two possibilities for continuing to develop as a brand: either you improve your products from the present, that is to say step-by-step. Or you give free rein to your creativity. The idea is to let your thoughts jump to the day after tomorrow, and to then move back from there to tomorrow."

Looking forward, while occasionally paying homage to the past, notable prototype models featured include the 2013 Macan Vision Safari, a sporty three-door vehicle that appears substantially similar to the production Macan SUV while drawing from Porsche's 911 Safari and 959 Paris-Dakar off-road icons. Also from 2013 is the 904 Living Legend. Thought by many to be one of Porsche's most timeless and beautiful designs, the



lightweight 1963-1965 racing legend was reconceptualized for contemporary times with a carbon-monocoque chassis and a 1.2-liter, V2 engine producing 200 horse-power and capable of revving to 12,000 rpm. Tipping its cap to the immortal Bus from sister company Volkswagen, the Vision Renndienst from 2018 is Porsche's take on a family-friendly electric van with room for up to six people.

Vehicles are showcased with a text by Jan Karl Beadeker and crisp photography by Stefan Bogner, who was allowed unfettered access by Porsche's design studio. A breezy, but informative read, *Porsche Unseen* is an opportunity for curious enthusiasts to eavesdrop on the process that transpires at Style Porsche, the marque's (only) design studio, in Weissach.

# Monterey Car Week Moneymobiles

As expected, August toppled all previous months of this year in terms of dollar volume and unit volume as 680 cars ran through the various auctions both online and in-person with \$58,551,955 in sales thanks to the auctions at Monterey's Car Week. The real surprise was the 66% sell-through rate, which is the lowest thus far in 2023.

Monterey, by itself, could be classified as a rough week for the Porsche Market, as only 61% of cars offered found new homes. The top of the market took the biggest hit, with cars over \$1m selling at only a 50% sell-through rate, with not a single car over \$2m hammering sold. We saw similar results online, with only one million-dollar car selling out of the five offered during the month. Only two of the \$1m+ cars sold were vintage race cars, with the rest being modern classics, a theme we've

seen this year played out in auction after auction.

In August, we saw more 356s cross the block than in any other month in memory, with a total of 50 cars, 33 of which sold. After a solid recent price run, the 356 market shows signs of softening as several cars brought final bids on the lower pricing side. One example would be the 1956 356A 1500 GS Carrera Speedster that sold for \$850,000 at Mecum. This time last year, we saw a GS/GT example hammer down at \$1,325,000, quite a price difference. We've also had several recent online sales on the softer side, with a 1965 356C Coupe in superb condition bringing only \$126,000 when these were recently going for over \$130k.

911 Turbos were a mixed bag, with only half of the early 930s finding homes and the average price hovering just over \$150k, thanks partly to the \$405,000 and \$267,500 paid for a pair of 1979 examples. Others hovered in the \$130k range, with a low of \$90,000 paid for a 1978 911 Turbo. Later, 3.3-liter 930s looked flat with an exceptional car, the very first 911 Turbo Slant Nose, failing to sell at a high bid of \$181,000. That car was most likely about \$100k short of where it needed to be, as it's such a significant part of Porsche's Turbo history.


964 Turbos continued their climb, with average prices for 3.3-liter cars cresting the \$180,000 mark and 3.6-liter cars over \$330,000. Surprisingly, a 1994 911 Turbo S 3.8 only brought \$800,000, as these cars have been in the \$1m range until the past two months. The 993 Turbo and Turbo S models also had a strong showing, with the lowest price paid being \$160,000 for

a modified 1996 example repainted in blue. On the other side of the coin, we had a new record achieved at \$810,000 for a sub-2,000-mile 1997 Turbo S finished in Cobalt with racing stripes to match the original owner's 917 and 935 race cars.

992 GT3s continued their slide with several bids in the \$240k range, and only one Touring example selling for over \$300k at Gooding & Co. The 991.1 GT3 RS showed some strength with an average sales price of around

\$200k. Where the GT market looked its softest was with RSRs. Of the three examples offered, none found homes, showing that they are either too new to be considered collectible race cars or sellers had hopes of much higher prices. Probably a combination of both.

# Open Letter to "Drive to Survive:"

Hi. You don't know me, but I've reviewed each of the past four seasons of your series. At this writing, Formula 1 is taking its annual summer break, a perfect time to weigh in on your plans for "Drive to Survive," season five.

Let me start by commending you for almost single-handedly putting Formula 1 on the American sports map. That's no small feat — like soccer, Formula 1 has been the next big thing in this country for, like, decades.

I remember the era when I had to wait months for the latest issue of Road & Track to arrive so I could actually read real coverage from the likes of Henry N. Manney III and then Rob Walker. There was literally no other way to follow the sport. Newspapers avoided coverage like the plague. Only one race was actually broadcast, Monaco, on ABC's Wide World of Sports. Then came the arrival of live telecasts, replaced by the live feed from Sky in the UK, along with Formula 1 Grand Prix Sunday. Please pinch me, it's hard to believe.

And now, this year we'll have three races in the US. I meet people who are not motorheads, and they start ruminating about whether Perez will keep his seat at Red Bull. I'm shocked. And very happy. And I owe it all to you and Netflix.

But this season you have a problem: the total dominance of Max Verstappen and Red Bull. Which will likely continue through the season's second half.

Don't just take it from me. *AutoWeek* recently ran a story titled "5 Biggest Disappointments of 2023 Formula 1 Season, So Far." Number one is "Not a single close battle up front."

What to do? Here's my plea. Let's move beyond the drama of the drivers. Yes, it's a shame that AlphaTauri summarily dropped Nyck de Vries. But, hey, there's a lot more to the sport than the carousel ride the drivers are on. Which makes this year the year to dive in, to expand fan knowledge ... and appreciation.

Here's how. Start with the cars. After all, I can't think of a sport where the equipment is as important to winning. So, just how do you drive them, what do the teams do? How do you ... win?

An interview with the genius behind the Red Bull design, Adrian Newey?

# Dear Tire Guy

#### **ON-SITE TIRES**

I've concluded that nobody likes me. I look like a tire and usually smell like a tire. Seriously, though, imagine carrying a tire with you everywhere. I look at people's tires at stoplights and in parking lots and quietly judge them. It's maybe a bit obsessive. So honestly I can understand the disappointment when I change the subject of a perfectly fine conversation from whatever I wasn't listening to to black rubber circles instead. You could probably even say people are ("ahem") tired...of me. Or maybe they're just... tread up...with my antics.

Good thing you're not here for my personality. So sorry if you are. But now I'm going to do what I do best: Occupy space! No, wait, the other one: Tell you about tires! I know it's summer, but the summer sun doesn't reclassify bald tires as street slicks. Have you looked at your tread lately?

Whether the roads are wet or dry, less tread always equals less stopping power on a road-going tire. Maybe snow is of no concern right now, but a child's basketball rolling into a neighborhood street is, and that's a situation in which you do not want to skid. Further, 2023 is the hailiest season on record in Colorado's history. Ice and water during these storms pose a serious hydroplaning risk to bald tires, which can lead to accidents, repairs, and higher insurance premiums.



Bald tires are also more prone to punctures. Less rubber between the top layer of tread and the carcass of the tire is an expressway for debris to puncture your tire more easily. A slow leak is bearable, sure, but a puncture can also cause a blowout that in a worst-case scenario can lead to you losing control of your vehicle.

Tires are nearing the end of their life at 4/32nd of an inch tread depth and dangerous at 2/32nd. To extend their life and keep you and your vehicle safe, check their tread and maintain the tires properly. Bald tires are all fun and games — until you have a blowout. No pressure. Until next month, drive on!


